1960-1976 - Church Founding and Early Years

The origins of Fernwood Baptist Church date back to the late 1950s when Spartanburg was experiencing rapid growth. During a pivotal meeting in 1958, a group began planting ideas for a six-acre tract of land on the city's east side in what was then known as Fernwood Farms.

On January 11, 1959, 107 charter members met and gave birth to Fernwood Baptist Church. Houston Elementary School served as the church's first home, with a series of interim pastors leading worship. A little more than a year after its founding, Fernwood called Rev. Dr. William L. Ball, Jr., to serve as its first pastor.

Dr. Ball rallied the church to raise funds, and on Sunday, July 29, 1962, the congregation assembled for its first service in what is now known as The William L. Ball, Jr. Chapel.



1967-1983 - Rev. Dr. DeBord

After Dr. Ball's retirement in 1967,
Fernwood called Rev. Dr. David DeBord
as its pastor. During his tenure, Rev.
Jean S. Pruett was called as Fernwood's
Minister of Education and Youth,
making her the first woman in this role
and the first ordained woman to serve
on staff. Fernwood had already affirmed
a place for women in ministry by being
one of the first churches in the area to
ordain a woman when charter member
Iva Mae Hendley was ordained as a
deacon. Later, after earning her
doctorate, Rev. Dr. Pruett was named
Minister of Education and Discipleship.

1984-2006 - Rev. Dr. P. Randall Wright

After Dr. DeBord's resignation, Rev. Dr. P. Randall Wright became Fernwood's third pastor. With wisdom and insight, he guided the church during the great upheaval in the Southern Baptist Convention. In 1991, Fernwood's Stewardship Ministry launched "Continuing the Vision," a two-year fundraising campaign for a new Sanctuary, and a dedication was held on May 7, 1995. A key element of the new sanctuary was the faceted-glass window bays designed by Jane Collins of Willet Stained Glass Studio in Philadelphia. The windows depict themes such as the beginning of time and the life of Christ. The window depicting Pentecost and the Acts of the Apostles was designated as the "Billy and Bessie Ball Window."



In the next years, many dedicated leaders were called to serve, including the Rev. Stuart L. Jones, who served as Minister to Students from 2001 until 2008, when he became Associate Pastor/Minister to Youth. He served in this position until 2016.

On April 21, 2002, Fernwood celebrated more growth with the dedication of the Easley Family Life Center, named in memory of Mary Barber and Genatus "Red" Easley. Recognizing the positive role that family and sports activities play in molding the lives of young people, the facility was designed with a gymnasium, kitchen, dining room and stage for hosting a variety of activities.

2006-2009 Interim Period

Following Dr. Wright's retirement in 2006, Rev. Dr. Jim Langford, Rev. Jones and ordained members guided the church. During this time, Fernwood voted to be identified as a Cooperative Baptist Fellowship church and to continue accepting the baptism of persons who transferred from other denominations.

2009-2014 - Revs. Drs. Dean and Lisa Allen

In April 2009, Drs. Lisa Wimberly Allen and Larry Dean Allen II jointly became Fernwood's pastors. As the first pastor-couple to serve Fernwood, the Allens complemented each other's preaching style and shepherding of the congregation. They also led in establishing a digital member directory and sponsoring the daughter of church members who was serving in Costa Rica. The Allens would lead the church until 2014, when they resigned to move closer to family.

2015-2017 - Rev. Bailey Nelson

Rev. Bailey Edwards Nelson, a gifted preacher, led us for two years following the Allens' departure.

2017-2019 Interim Period

Following Rev. Nelson's resignation,
Fernwood was led by two interim
pastors – Rev. Dr. Dan R. Vincent and
Rev. Eric Coleman. During this time, the
Fernwood congregation chose to
become an affirming church and
welcome LGBTQIA members in
leadership roles. In 2018, Fernwood
began hosting a space at the annual
Upstate Pride Festival. Then, in August
of 2019, the church became the physical
home of Uplift Outreach Center, an
organization for LGBTQIA youth in
Spartanburg.























2019-2024 - Rev. Matt Johnson

In June of 2019, Rev. Matthew K. Johnson became Fernwood's pastor. Within months, he was faced with leading the church through the tumultuous times of the COVID-19 pandemic. While the congregation was no longer meeting in person, Fernwood began streaming worship services on Facebook. The church also struggled with the passing of several integral members during this time. Despite the challenges, Fernwood grew, attracting many young families and establishing The Gap Sunday School class, comprised of young adults.

2025 and beyond

Following Rev. Johnson's departure in June of 2024, Fernwood began an intentional interim transition process. Led by Rev. Michael Tutterow, the process affirmed Fernwood's identity as a progressive congregation and identified several ministry priorities for its future.



Membership & Attendance




Our congregation is a blend of the old and the new, both the ages of our population and in membership tenure.

Adult Sunday School

Footprints and Gap Classes

Our Footprints class is a lecture-based Sunday school class oriented toward the 45+ crowd. Our Gap class is discussion-based and oriented toward the 20+ crowd. All members are welcome at both! Each class enjoys fellowship at church on Sunday mornings and off-campus events throughout the year.

Wednesday Nights

Dinner, Prayer, and Study

Wednesday nights, we gather together for a delicious catered meal to share good food and friendship. After dinner, we share prayers and then engage in a topical study. This year, we are studying world religions.

Childrens' Ministries

Nursery, Pre-School, Elementary, and Youth

We have two paid nursery worker positions to assist in caring for our youngest members. Additionally, we have programming for preschool, elementary, and middle and high school students during the Sunday School hour. Children 5+ are encouraged to join their families in worship.

Other Events and Gatherings Member-led

Our church also hosts multiple member-led events and gatherings for the congregation, including a monthly book club, an Out and About Fernwood group for our LGBTQIA+ members and allies, and a monthly game night.

Music Ministry

Sanctuary Choir and Fernwood Ringers

Music expresses our love for God, communicates our faith and understanding, and provides ministry to others. At Fernwood, there are a number of opportunities to worship God and to serve our neighbor through music by being a part of our ensembles. Our primary desire is to glorify God as we continue to build a ministry featuring music that is diverse, vital, and faithful; to take care of the artists God sends our way; and to promote musical and spiritual growth in all people.

The Fernwood Sanctuary Choir leads the congregation in worship through music each Sunday. They share music in a variety of styles — traditional anthems, sacred masterworks, spirituals, contemporary gospel, and hymn arrangements. Although our roots are firmly anchored in traditional anthems and sacred masterworks, we enjoy worshiping and performing music in all of these styles. Membership in the Sanctuary Choir is open to adults of any age.

Fernwood Ringers is a dedicated group of musicians who rehearse weekly and share their music in worship services, generally once a month. The Fernwood Ringers have also participated in state, regional, and denominational handbell festivals. Membership in the Fernwood Ringers is open to adults and high school youth who know how to read music and are interested in ringing.

Ministry Teams

How We Serve

Fernwood believes that God has a purpose for each of us within the context of the local church and beyond. We ask each individual to listen closely for God's call and respond boldly by identifying their talents and passions for ministry. Each ministry team has a facilitator who coordinates the team's activities. Ministry teams are managed by the ministry council, who coordinate activities on the church calendar. These teams are grouped into four focus areas: Worship, Belonging, Investing, and Serving. Participants can choose the teams where they feel called to serve, serve on multiple ministry teams, or even create a team, and can choose their level of involvement in each.

Worship Ministry Teams assist the pastor in enriching our worship experiences, welcome all who come onto our campus, and make sure the church is safe for members and guests.

Belonging Ministry Teams coordinate activities and opportunities for all ages to connect and grow in their faith, as well as keep members connected to one another and the church connected to our community through tools and technology.

Investing Ministry Teams provide oversight and stewardship of our finances, staffing, buildings and grounds, and the use of our facilities.

Serving Ministry Teams work within the congregation, the community, and nationally and internationally through missions, providing fellowship and outreach opportunities, educating and providing the body of Christ with opportunities to be the hands and feet and to care for God's children and creation at large.

Our Community


The City of Spartanburg

The city of Spartanburg is the fifthlargest city in the state, and the area is thriving! We're a college town showcasing seven colleges and universities with 15,000 students, and have a current population of 343,000 living in the county. With an average of 11 people per day moving to the area, projections estimate the population of Spartanburg County to boom to 358,000 by the year 2027. The city of Spartanburg, population 40,000, remains an affordable, quiet college town with a thriving arts community, ideal for families, young and old, to call home. Don't ask us - Newsweek magazine has named Spartanburg one of the top three cities in the nation attracting millennials.

Community Churches


Being in the Bible belt, there is a strong Baptist presence in Spartanburg. However, Fernwood Baptist is unique in that, out of 200 Baptist churches in the county, we are the only one that is affiliated with the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship and not dually aligned with the Southern Baptist Convention. We take pride in our identity as a progressive voice in this community.





Of those 200 Baptist congregations, only three contribute to the CBF. Two of these contributors are also aligned with the SBC.

The Soup Kitchen was born when Christians from 2nd Presbyterian Church saw the hungry people in Spartanburg and decided to do something about it. Fernwood began its support at the Soup Kitchen on an irregular basis in these early days. We are especially important to this ministry, now as we were then, because we provide both the food and the volunteers to prepare and serve the food.

After more than a decade of being the home for this ministry, the 2nd Presbyterian Church congregation decided to raise funds to build the current location, which has a better layout to meet the needs to serve this population. The people of Fernwood helped with the fundraising, and we committed to regularly support this ministry. We are anticipated, loved and deeply appreciated for our contributions and commitments.
